At SIGA, community investment is a core value. The organization invests nearly \$2 million annually into initiatives that support health, education, culture and economic development. Now, SIGA is extending that commitment to include kidney care by giving a very generous matching gift of \$100,000 to the By Your Side Kidney Care Campaign.

"One of our guiding principles, Wîtaskêwin, refers to sharing the land or, in today's terms, sharing our resources," says Desiree Gervais, Vice President of Human Resources and Corporate Relations. "This principle drives our dedication to Sharing Success with the communities that our seven SIGA Casinos and online PlayNow Saskatchewan serve. This commitment naturally led us to support the By Your Side Campaign."

The campaign was a natural fit for SIGA's commitment to community, as health is one of its community investment pillars and the campaign addresses a critical health challenge in Saskatchewan. Chronic kidney disease affects 1 in 10 people in Saskatchewan, with 1 in 3 Indigenous Peoples impacted by the diagnosis. "By supporting kidney care initiatives, we're empowering communities, strengthening families and reducing the burdens that come with managing chronic illness ... creating lasting change that extends well beyond the hospital," Gervais explains.

The nonprofit First Nation organization has seen these effects firsthand. "Kidney disease has a profound impact on the 74 First Nation communities we represent at SIGA, as well as on our employees. As a leading First Nation employer with around 1,600 staff members, we have witnessed kidney disease impact on our team members and their loved ones," says Gervais.

Because the By Your Side Campaign includes both early detection and culturally safe care, the "impact will be measurable in lives saved and families kept together," Gervais says.

SIGA President and CEO Zane Hansen shares this vision. "Health care works best when it respects the diverse needs of all patients and their families," says Hansen. "SIGA is proud to support the By Your Side Campaign because it creates solutions that truly serve our communities. The Early Screening Program will help prevent the development of kidney disease so people can remain at home with their families, while the [Indigenous] Healing Centre will offer a supportive space for Indigenous Peoples from across the province, providing cultural programming and traditional supports alongside quality medical care."

That vision is already taking shape. Chief Tammy Cook-Searson, who serves as Chief of Lac La Ronge Indian Band and Chair of the SIGA Board of Directors, sees the benefits of early screening during the pilot Early Screening Program that is running in partnership with her own communities. "The Lac La Ronge Indian Band is participating in the pilot Early Screening Program, where I witnessed how early screening can prevent the progression of kidney disease. The pilot program also provided band members with valuable education and awareness on the impacts of kidney disease. This experience reinforced why I see the By Your Side Campaign as a vital investment in building resilient communities across Saskatchewan," says Cook-Searson. "Strong communities start with healthy families who have access to quality health care."

Chief Cook-Searson echoes Zane Hansen's sentiments regarding the new Indigenous Healing Centre, adding that "while early screening can help prevent the progression of kidney disease, equally important is ensuring culturally appropriate care when treatment is needed. The Indigenous Healing Centre will provide a safe space for thousands of First Nations Peoples from across the province during their time at St. Paul's Hospital."

SIGA's support of St. Paul's Hospital and Foundation is having a true impact. "SIGA believes in partnerships that create real, lasting change for the communities we serve," Hansen concludes. "Through the By Your Side Campaign, we're supporting Early Screening Programs and culturally appropriate treatment options that together create a more complete health care experience that serves both medical and cultural needs for the people of Saskatchewan."



Committed to End-of-Life Care: Mike and Rhonda Stensrud

For Mike and Rhonda Stensrud, supporting end-of-life care is deeply personal. It is not just about giving back; it is about offering comfort, dignity and peace to people in some of life's most vulnerable moments. The Stensruds' decision to be matched-gift donors for SPH Foundation's recent Giving Light mailing reflects their long-standing commitment to supporting compassionate care at SPH's Palliative Care Unit and the Hospice at Glengarda, building on their past generous gifts to the Hospice.

Mike served eight years on the Board of Directors for the former Saskatoon Health Region, including a term as Chair. During this time, he experienced the health care system from a new perspective. That experience stirred him to support the creation of environments where people facing end of life are met with gentleness rather than urgency, and surrounded by peace instead of a clinical setting. His work to bring a residential hospice to Saskatoon became a defining project.

"The development of the Hospice is one of the best, maybe the best achievement that we had during my time as Chair of the Saskatoon Health Region," Mike says.

The drive to support the Hospice did not come only from boardroom insight; it came from Mike and Rhonda's personal experiences supporting family and friends as they moved through the health care system and faced end of life. From his sister's hospital stays to the final journeys of his parents, Mike's connection to health care became deeply human.

"Those connections, I think, forge a tighter bond than just a give-back sort of approach."

Those bonds inspired him to keep pushing, building partnerships, advocating behind the scenes and helping guide the hospice project to completion alongside of leadership at Emmanuel Health and St. Paul's Hospital. Today, the Hospice at Glengarda stands as a place of calm and care for families during a time when they need it most. "I think it's just absolutely fantastic," Mike says. "The only thing more important than living well is dying well, and if you can have a little bit of peace and tranquility at the end, that's so important."

Mike also serves as a trustee with the Maunders McNeil Foundation, which contributed to the Hospice as well. When the chance came to serve as the matched-gift donor for the 2024 and 2025 Giving Light mailings, Mike and Rhonda were glad to help.

"Anytime you can help factor your own donation, I think it's a wonderful thing. Everybody feels like their giving is amplified," Mike explains.

Their hope is simple: that others might feel inspired to give as well, knowing they are helping someone find peace at the end.

"I think dedicated end-of-life spaces can provide that peace of mind and that little bit of tranquility," Mike concludes.


For Mike and Rhonda, that is the greatest gift of all.

Vegas Garden Party

On May 10, 2025, Bohlmann Event Productions, led by mother and son Sheila and Tristan Bohlmann, hosted the Vegas Garden Party to raise awareness and funds for kidney health. Inspired by Sheila's kidney transplant in January 2024, the event aimed to bring attention to and provide support for the growing demand for dialysis and kidney transplants in Saskatchewan.

MRI Scanner Retrofit

This retrofit transformed our 2008 scanner into a Siemens Avanto Fit System, increasing patient capacity and improving accuracy and efficiency. That means shorter wait times, faster diagnoses and better outcomes for the thousands of patients who rely on us every year. St. Paul's plays a key role in providing MRI exams in our region, and now we can do even more thanks to your support. Your contribution has truly made this possible.

Digital X-Ray Suite

Because of your generous support, we are excited to share that the new Digital X-Ray Suite at St. Paul's Hospital is now fully

operational and delivering on everything we set out to achieve.

Thanks to the \$485,000 contributed by our thoughtful community, patients are now receiving faster, safer and more accurate diagnostic imaging. This new technology captures high-quality digital images of bones, lungs and organs, helping our teams diagnose fractures, infections and other conditions quickly and effectively. With improved efficiency and image clarity, we can begin treatment plans sooner and provide better care to every patient who comes through our doors.

Our Digital X-Ray Suites are in high demand, performing more than 20,000 scans annually. They also allow off-site radiologists to review images remotely, which is especially valuable in urgent situations. Your generosity has helped make this possible. Thank you for ensuring patients in our community have access to the advanced care they need, when they need it most.



Portable X-Ray

Portable X-Ray

Thanks to donor generosity, our Foundation was able to distribute \$162,000 to bring a life-changing piece of technology to St. Paul's: the Portable X-Ray System. We now perform over 5,000 scans a year with this vital equipment. The Portable X-Ray System allows care teams to bring imaging directly to patients' bedsides, especially those in critical condition. This is making a real impact in high-need areas like the ICU, trauma and emergency rooms, recovery units and inpatient wards.

The ability to conduct fast, accurate imaging without transporting vulnerable patients improves both comfort and care. It also speeds up diagnosis and treatment decisions when every second matters. Our imaging team has reported that they love the new equipment! Because of you, our health care providers have the tools they need to deliver exceptional care right when and where it's needed most. We are deeply grateful for your role in making this possible.


NanoKnife

In 2016, SPH Foundation committed \$500,000 to help launch a bold new initiative that brought together the former Saskatoon Health Region, the Ministry of Health and the Foundation in a unique partnership. That investment supported the collaborative efforts of Dr. Kunal Jana, Dr. Trustin Domes, Dr. Chris Wall and Dr. Michael Moser to introduce NanoKnife, a cutting-edge cancer treatment using electrical pulses to destroy tumours while sparing surrounding healthy tissue. What began as a pilot study, positioning Saskatoon as one of the first centres in Canada to use the technology,

has grown into a nationally recognized program offering patients safer, less invasive alternatives to major surgery.

For many, NanoKnife means shorter hospital stays, fewer complications and better quality of life. Today, under the leadership of Dr. Chris Wall, the most experienced NanoKnife operator in Canada, St. Paul's is home to one of only three NanoKnife programs in the country. Donor support has made this innovation possible, and we are truly grateful to our community for their trust and generosity.

Our community's commitment to innovation throughout our Hospital has led to real change. In our Diagnostic Imaging Unit, our donors' support has transformed how we care for patients. Now we are using this momentum to propel a transformative journey for our Interventional Radiology team within Diagnostic Imaging.

At St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon, the future of patient care is being shaped by innovation and precision in Interventional Radiology (IR). This rapidly evolving field transforms how medical conditions are treated, using minimally invasive techniques guided by real-time imaging. This allows patients to heal faster and with less discomfort compared to traditional surgery.

Central to the IR team's progress is the plan to develop a new, state-of-the-art Interventional Radiology suite. St. Paul's Hospital Foundation is leading the effort to bring this important project to life. Currently, thousands of patients a year are served by our existing suite. A new suite will enhance the Hospital's ability to deliver cutting-edge care, combining multiple diagnostic tools in one room and improving efficiency and accuracy. The new suite will support patients throughout our Hospital, including:

- Emergency trauma victims who need immediate, minimally invasive interventions to stop bleeding and save their lives.
- Those who need vascular surgery; our Interventional Radiologists support our vascular surgeons before and during vital procedures.
- Cancer patients who will avoid major surgery because of targeted, image-guided ablation.
- Patients with prostate disease who require quick, non-invasive kidney drainage procedures that dramatically reduce the risk of infection and maintain health, comfort and dignity.
- Patients with chronic pelvic pain who find relief and hope through a therapy that restores their quality of life.

With this transformed suite, procedures will become even faster, safer and more precise. At the same time, health care providers will benefit from reduced radiation exposure and improved efficiency, which will allow them to focus their energy on patient care. Having CT scan capabilities within the IR suite will also free up hospital resources, making diagnostic services more accessible for many patients.

The Foundation's work to fund this project will ensure St. Paul's remains at the forefront of health care innovation in Saskatchewan. By advancing care close to home, St. Paul's is ready to meet the growing needs of patients throughout the region. Alongside the Foundation's \$2 million fundraising initiative, the Saskatchewan Health Authority is also contributing \$1 million toward this vital technology.

This project serves as a powerful example of what's possible when our province, our Foundation and our community come together.

The Leslie and Irene Dubé Urology Centre of Health Prostate Cancer Symposium:

Survive and Thrive is more than an event — it is a powerful reminder that care doesn't stop at the doors of St. Paul's Hospital. It extends education and community connection, made possible by the support of generous donors who believe in a better path forward for patients and families affected by a prostate cancer diagnosis.

This meaningful annual event is celebrating its 13th year in 2025, with Dr. Kishore Visvanathan serving as an outstanding host for the final time before his upcoming retirement. Sessions will include "Incontinence After Prostate Cancer Therapy" with Dr. Garson Chan, Urologist and Associate

Professor at the University of Saskatchewan, and "The Science of Empowerment" with Dr. Rob Rutledge, Urologist and Associate Professor of Medicine at Dalhousie University, which will highlight the effects of diet, stress management and exercise on wellness after a diagnosis of prostate cancer.

This important symposium acknowledges that a patient's prostate cancer journey does not end following their treatment, as side effects and challenges can continue after treatment ends. The symposium is yet another example of our Foundation's commitment to serving the health of our community in a holistic way that supports patients not only at the Hospital but in their homes, with their families and in their everyday lives.

The Power of Generosity


Thanks to the generosity of our Foundation's donor community and a dedicated committee of volunteers, the event is offered free of charge each year to all who attend.

Music Saving Lives

It was a Thursday afternoon in St. Paul's Hospital when my life was changed forever. I had gone looking for books to read when I heard the most beautiful voice and guitar playing I had ever heard. I sat, totally enchanted with this music running through my mind's eye. What I realized was my love of music was returning, which had vanished for 20 years. What that accomplished was a return of my life to me. I realized in no uncertain terms that I wanted to go on living! I completely owe my life to Lisa, that chance meeting, and that beautiful music.
