

#### The Light Comes From Us

When I found out that I was being hired by St. Paul's Hospital, I immediately called my mother who was a student and then nurse here at St. Paul's back in the 1960's. On top of that, my father was a board member in our health region and I was born at the Grey Nun Hospital in Biggar so to become a part of Catholic healthcare in Saskatchewan means a lot to me.

I wanted to get the St. Paul's Hospital sacred heart statue logo tattooed on my arm; I was that proud!

So when I heard that we were moving in the direction of a new re-brand (which meant the old logo was going to be replaced!) I immediately asked to be on the committee with the sole purpose of trying to save Jesus! And I was a painin-the-butt on that committee the whole time...up until a few weeks ago.

I looked at our Sacred Heart logo and I realized that I was not the first person to cling to the body of Jesus. When Mary Magdalene first saw Jesus after he was crucified, she didn't recognize him; the resurrection had changed somehow.







She only came to recognize him when he called her by her name and immediately she fell to his feet and put a strangle hold on his ankles. She had lost him once, she wasn't going to lose him again. But what did Jesus say to her? He said, "Do not cling to me, I have not yet ascended" (John 20:17).

I, too, wanted to hold on to the body of Jesus but that was *never* the plan. The body was the past. The resurrection was the future. The light of his love has always what was meant to carry on.

The current logo is of the Sacred Heart statue which has been a denizen of Pleasant Hill for over a 100 years. His welcoming arms are not going away. If anything, we have taken him from the roof, to a pedestal to the ground. Now we are putting that light inside each one of us.



#### At the Heart of Our History: Holding Relationships and Legacy Together

**Chief Whitecap** 

At St. Paul's Hospital, we are called to care not just for patients but for the relationships that shape our healing work.

Long before the founding of our hospital, this place was shaped by the leadership and generosity of Chief Whitecap (Wapahaska) of the Dakota Nation. His guidance helped early settlers locate the site that would become Saskatoon. Among those settlers was Gerald Willoughby, a teacher and realtor who became one of Chief Whitecap's close friends.

Their friendship was built on mutual respect. Chief Whitecap developed a relationship of trust between the Nation and Settlers, communicating through Gerald. When members of Whitecap's community traveled to Saskatoon for supplies. Gerald offered them shelter and hospitality—simple acts that deepened understanding between peoples at a time of division. During the 1885 North-West Resistance, when Chief Whitecap was wrongly accused of treason, Gerald stood beside him in court, testifying to his honesty and loyalty. His words helped secure Whitecap's acquittal. This story of courage and friendship continues to remind us that reconciliation begins with relationship.

Years later, that same spirit of compassion and connection shaped the founding of St. Paul's Hospital. In 1907, during a devastating typhoid outbreak, Dr. John (J.H.C.) Willoughby, Gerald's brother and one of Saskatoon's first physicians, opened his home to care for the sick. Two Grey Nuns, Sister Xavier

Guay and Sister Elizabeth Phaneuf, answered a call for help from local clergy and joined him in this work. Together, they transformed his home into the city's first hospital—a place of hope for all who suffered.

The Willoughby brothers, Chief Whitecap, and the Grey Nuns each played a role in shaping a community grounded in care and compassion. Yet these stories also live within a more complex history—one that includes both healing and harm. While the Grey Nuns brought comfort to many, their work unfolded within colonial systems that caused deep pain for Indigenous Peoples and communities.

At St. Paul's Hospital, we hold these truths together—with deep gratitude for those whose compassion shaped our beginnings, and sincere humility to acknowledge the wounds that remain.


Together — For Good is more than our brand; it is a living commitment to reconciliation—to walk alongside

# Honouring the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation at St. Paul's Hospital

We recently held two meaningful events at St. Paul's Hospital in recognition of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. We started the morning with Teedly and Bluejay Linklater leading a beautiful cleansing ceremony (smudge) and a circle of singing and storytelling. They shared from the heart, and their presence deeply impacted more than 60 participants, including children, patients, and staff. We are grateful for the opportunity to learn from them and to be part of such a powerful and healing experience. This was the first time some of our staff have participated in a ceremony like this.

We also welcomed Lyndon Linklater, a Knowledge Keeper and traditional storyteller. Lyndon shared his personal story and began teachings on Traditional Indigenous Sweat Lodges. Lyndon has opened up his family's Sweat Lodge to St. Paul's Hospital staff. One conversation that impacted me was about language. Many Indigenous languages have been taken away, yet they hold deep cultural and spiritual significance. What struck me was the contrast: we often travel to countries like Kenya (where I lived for six years), where

there are over 40 tribes and over 40 languages spoken, and we celebrate that diversity with awe. Yet here at home, we have not shown the same reverence or celebration for the Indigenous languages and nations of this land. It's time to celebrate the languages and cultures that are the history of this land. We need to celebration the tribes, languages and culture of this land.

I've heard it said more than once now: seven generations have been impacted by inter-generational trauma, and it may take seven generations of healing to see full reconciliation. There is work that needs to be done, and it is work, it will take time, and it is incredibly important to participate in the journey of reconciliation in Canada. This is part of our treaty relationship.

While September 30th is the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, our responsibility does not end there. We must live in the Spirit of Truth and Reconciliation, it's a daily commitment. Participating in events like these is not a box to check but an act of reconciliation, part of an ongoing journey that we are all invited into.

I am on my own personal journey, and I encourage you to walk yours, with action, purpose, engagement and an open mind and heart.

## A New Chapter for Healing at St. Paul's Hospital

For many years, St. Paul's Hospital in Saskatoon has been known as a place of care and compassion. Yet, for Indigenous patients and families, the hospital experience has not always reflected the full meaning of wellness. Spiritual well-being, traditional healing, and culturally safe spaces were often limited, leaving many without the comfort of practices that have guided generations toward balance and recovery.

#### That is now changing.

The new Healing Centre at St. Paul's Hospital & Foundation represents a transformation in how care is delivered — one that honours both modern medicine and Indigenous ways of knowing. It is being built alongside the hospital's expanded front entrance, symbolizing a welcome that is open to every person, culture, and faith.

At the heart of this new space is the recognition that healing is more than treatment. It is connection to spirit, to land, to ceremony, and to community. The Healing Centre will provide dedicated space for smudging, prayer, drumming, and ceremony. It will be a place where Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and patients' families can gather in dignity and safety, knowing that their traditions are respected as integral to health and wellness.

Indigenous Leaders from the community, including the Saskatchewan Health Authority's First Nations and Métis Health team has been deeply involved in shaping the vision of this centre. Through years of dialogue, partnership, and trust-building, they have worked to ensure the space reflects the values of wâhkôhtowin — relationship — and miyo-pimâtisiwin — the good life. Their presence will support ongoing engagement with

Indigenous communities, guide staff in cultural responsiveness, and provide direct connection to traditional healing practices.

What makes this project unique is not just the bricks and mortar, but the philosophy it represents. This is reconciliation in action: a shared goal to create a health system that is not only medically excellent, but spiritually safe and inclusive. The Healing Centre bridges a history of limited space for Indigenous practices with a future where those practices stand alongside Western medicine, equal in value and importance.

When the Healing Centre opens, St. Paul's Hospital and Foundation will stand as a place of true partnership — where patients can experience care that tends to body, mind, and spirit. Together, we are building a brighter, healthier future for everyone who walks through its doors.

I am pleased to introduce to you the hospital chaplains supporting Catholic patients in Saskatoon. Fr Benedict Araakal is the full-time hospital chaplain. He is from Kerala, India. Fr Daniel Louh is working part-time and is assigned to St Paul's hospital Tuesday & Wednesday. He is from the Ivory Coast, West Africa. Monseigneur Don Vito Pavilando is the chaplain assigned to Sunday Mass at St Paul's hospital at 4:00 pm. He is from the Philippines.

The RC diocese has been working to expand its religious presence at St Paul's hospital. As a faith-based hospital, there is a greater expectation that religious are available to help support the needs of the patients. Because of growing demand, the diocese employed a new,

part-time priest this past spring to support patients.

In other news, a new memorandum of understanding by the Roman Catholic diocese of Saskatoon and the Saskatchewan Health Authority was created and signed. This memo, "endorses the principle that all persons have a right to the spiritual and religious care of their choice, including while receiving care at an SHA acute care facility". Through this memo, our partnership with healthcare staff can continue, improving patient care. Other churches including the United Church, Lutheran, Anglican and the Ukrainian Eparchy has also signed this memorandum of understanding.

Fr. Benedict Arakkal, Fr. Daniel Louh, and I continue our hospital visits, providing support to those who have requested it. We are thankful for the opportunity to continue supporting patients in every hospital.

From: 3SHealth Provincial Linen Services and K-Bro Linen Systems

K-Bro is experiencing a shortage on green scrubs this past week and asking for your help. The SHA customers can support and help mitigate these concerns by only ordering what is required and continuously circulating inventory.

Please ensure you are only taking what is needed for your shift and not stock piling scrubs in your lockers as this is only escalating the problem. K-Bro is expecting a drop shipment to arrive within the next week but want to ensure they have enough inventory to supply the emergency areas first.

- Priority is given to surgical areas that require scrubs
- Scrubs are meant to be used in cases where the staff have a high incident of being exposed to blood and body fluids
- We continue to ask staff to change out of scrubs prior to going home

Some of the low priority areas might see substitution of other sizes until this inventory concerns has resolved.

Therefore, inventory continues to not be returned as quickly as it is going out. K-Bro is doing their due diligence to mitigate this best they can.



Different colors symbolize different elements. Shades of red, orange, and yellow reflect courage, regeneration, and strength, all aspects essential to the healing process.



Artistic creations reflect internal emotions, and the colors selected visualize these feelings. For instance, bright colors represent joy and happiness. Art also encourages exploration of one's deeper self.



Art places an individual in the moment and captures imagination and creativity. Art facilitates release and expression of emotions and feelings on paper and provides an avenue towards good health and good outcomes.

#### **Truth and Reconciliation Responsive Art**



Artwork tells a story, reminisces events, and captures memories. Further, art heals through spiritual expression.

Art is practiced for healing, enjoyment, growth, and connection while representing one's story. The Healing Arts Program embodies these principles by fostering selfexpression and collaboration through artistic creation. The presented artistic pieces reflect active participation in traditional and alternative forms of healing within a healthcare setting, thus responding to TRC Call to Action 22. Reconciliation is a dynamic process that varies across individuals. Health providers must acknowledge and respect these diverse experiences of reconciliation and
